Labyrinths are used in Christianity for contemplation, reflection and evoke the character of a pilgrimage, reflecting our life journey to reconnect with God at the center of the Labyrinth.

It is a spiritual tool that can help us find our way.



Generally there are three stages to the walk:

- Releasing on the way in
- Receiving in the center
- · Returning when you follow the path back out of the labyrinth.

Symbolically, and sometimes actually, you are taking back out into the world that which you have received.

There is no right way or wrong way to walk a labyrinth. Use the labyrinth in any way that meets what you need while being respectful of others walking. You may go directly to the center to sit quietly -- whatever meets your needs.

Today after the service, we invite you to walk either of the labyrinths on your way to coffee hour and experience the power and energy of this ancient symbol.
