# **Emergency Shelter Partnership**

The Emergency Shelter Program (ESP) is a coalition of more than 20 congregations and groups working together to provide emergency shelter during the coldest months of the year. In early December 2004, a group of community leaders from Mt. Kisco approached area clergy with a concern about those in our communities who would not have a place to stay as the winter approached. Out of that conversation grew what has become the Emergency Shelter Partnership. From the first winter when 4 congregations took turns hosting about 10 individuals for 11 weeks, the ESP has grown. Each winter 15 congregations take turns providing shelter for between 10 and 30 individuals from the first week in November through the last week in March. Since we began there has not been a single death due to exposure in our communities. The program has worked so well that it has served as a model that other communities have copied. Bedford Presbyterian Church (BPC) was instrumental in beginning the ESP. After several years of the Bedford Presbyterian Church serving as the Fiscal Sponsor for ESP, the organization is now an independent 501(c)(3) corporation.

#### Volunteer Opportunities:

Each winter BPC hosts the shelter for two weeks. Often it is the third or fourth week of December and again around Easter. Volunteers from BPC can sign up to provide and serve a meal to those who stay with us, can volunteer to spend the night to support ESP's paid overnight supervisor and can also volunteer to provide breakfast bags for individuals to take with them when they leave in the morning. Preparing breakfast bags and preparing and serving a meal are great opportunities for entire families to participate. One of the evening meals during each week is prepared and served by high school youth that are interested in helping. If you would like to help or would like more information about the ESP...

### Midnight Run

Bedford Presbyterian Church's (BPC) involvement with the Midnight Run started with three high school girls almost 30 years ago. They had heard about the Midnight Run and thought that our church should participate. After convincing the church leadership that it was the right thing to do, they helped to organize our first Midnight Run in the late winter of 1990. Since then, literally, hundreds of middle school students, high school students and adults have participated in a Midnight Run. The Midnight Run provides opportunities throughout the year for youth and

adults to interact with and deliver donated food, clothing, blankets and toiletries to homeless people in Manhattan. Because many people measure accomplishment by "the numbers," here are some that seem particularly important:

We've taken more than 3,500 mostly young people (although Prudy Hodge went twice when she was 84!) on about 400 runs. Some runs have included two people; others have included as many as 29.

During this time, we have provided 9,000+ toiletry kits (the homeless want to be clean), 14,000 pairs of socks, underwear, thousands of sweaters, hats, gloves, trousers and blankets. We have served 23,000+ sack lunches, 900+ gallons of soup, and 900+ gallons (that's 14,400 cups) of coffee/tea to about 8,000 of our society's most vulnerable human beings.

But it's not about the numbers. What is accomplished on these runs cannot be measured. Come and join us.

<u>Volunteer Opportunities</u>: There are several ways to participate: you can make soup or sack lunches, sort and/or donate clothing/toiletries, and of course, go along on a Run. You'll be surprised how good you feel and there are lots of folks who will be so glad to see you. About 2 times a year, the church organizes a Run into Manhattan. We leave about 7:00 pm and are back in Bedford by 1 am or so. This is a great opportunity for teenagers and their parents to participate together. We also always need individuals or families that are willing to make soup or bag lunches for us to distribute in the city. Clothing and toiletries are always needed. A clothing drive for the Midnight Run is a great opportunity for a scout group or just a group of families to organize. #### **Mount Kisco Interfaith Food Pantry**

In operation since 1991, the Food Pantry is supported by thirteen local congregations. Bedford Presbyterian Church has been an integral part of this mission since the Pantry's inception. Located in the United Methodist Church in Mount Kisco, the Food Pantry provides groceries to needy people in the community. They serve an average of 245 families each week and donations are always needed. Clients are those in need of having their food needs supplemented. The Food Pantry supplies enough balanced nutrition for 3 meals. The Food Pantry has an Executive Director and a Board of Directors consisting of representatives of 13 local faith organizations including Bedford Presbyterian.

#### **Volunteer Opportunities:**

This is a wonderful opportunity for families to volunteer together. Kids must be in high school to participate. The Pantry is open on Tuesday evenings from 5pm-7pm and Wednesday mornings from 9am-11am. Every two months it is our church's

responsibility to oversee the distribution of food. When volunteers are needed, we would be most appreciative of your willingness to help out. If you cannot help out, your financial contribution is most welcome and goes directly to buying food for the Westchester Food Bank.

### **The Community Center**

The Community Center, located in nearby Katonah, is a nonprofit organization serving the needy in Northern Westchester County. #### A-HOME

For over 30 years A-HOME has been a cost effective, local solution to the national crisis in affordable housing. A-HOME is a coalition of churches, temples and civic groups dedicated to providing affordable housing for low-income seniors, single-parent families, and disabled individuals, who cannot afford market rates. A-HOME rehabilitates, builds and manages affordable rental housing in northern Westchester County, NY for this population.

A-HOME promotes independent living in a network of community support. A coalition of 26 local civic and religious organizations supports A-HOME with funding and volunteers. A-HOME has renovated or built, and now operates more than 17 houses in Bedford Hills, Chappaqua, Croton Falls, Katonah, Mount Kisco, Pound Ridge, Thornwood and South Salem. It also manages one for the Blue Mountain Housing Development Corporation. Each year gifts are given and financial contributions are made at Christmas by members of Bedford Presbyterian. Our Westchester Youth Alliance (interfaith high school program) held their work days at A-HOME sites for several years.

### **Spirituality Group**

### **Bible Study**

The Bible Study group meets each Tuesday from 10:30 to 11:30 in the small conference room at BPC. The purpose is to develop a greater understanding of the Bible by the close reading and discussion of its individual books. The historical and cultural background from which these scriptures emerged is of particular interest. We read from a variety of translations of the Protestant, Greek Orthodox and Roman Catholic Bibles. Two of the Group members are conversant in Greek and one in Hebrew. They are particularly helpful in understanding difficult passages.

The group comes from a variety of religious backgrounds and includes both members of BPC as well as non-members. Leadership of the discussion rotates among the participants. The group is congenial, and the conversation is both informal and informative! ### **Sunday Spirit**

The Sunday Spirit program provides Christian education for children in Kindergarten through Eighth grade during worship. Sunday Spirit is a warm, fun and welcoming environment. Our goal is to have children want to come to Sunday Spirit. Lessons focus on learning about God and the teachings of Jesus through examples of faithful living. We do our best to provide active, hands on and interactive activities. Discussing and "talking to the children" is limited. Creating continuity between our lessons, the Time with the Children, and special church events, the goal is to build a "faith foundation" for our children that will sustain them in good times as well as in bad times.

  comfort for the children. Having their own space to access toys, and hang up
  artwork also makes for a cozy, warm and welcoming environment adding to

#### **Program Developments**

We have continued with the premise that simpler is better. The Sunday Spirit calendar year has been broken up into themes and class format simplified. Class format is as follows: Prayer, Opening Activity/Warm up, Book/Discussion, Hands on or Interactive Activity. Bible scripture is always included to give children the practice and opportunity to look up passages in the bible. Themes we often focus on are: Community, Kindness, Gratitude, Tolerance, Love, Renewal, Giving, Faith, Friendship, and Seeds for Growth. Our simplified class format makes it easier for our teachers, who teach on a volunteer basis. Middle School teens who attend on Sunday mornings are offered the opportunity to join the younger classes or remain in worship.

#### **Program Favorites**

Even though we have simplified our class format and categorized the year into themes, we have not forgotten about our favorites. In the Fall, children participate in the annual World Communion Bread Making day and World Communion Sunday. Children learn about the Christmas Story through individual story illustrations, which are shown at the 5:00pm Christmas Eve Service. Our annual Christmas Pageant is a favorite with an average of 20 to 35 children participating. The Children's Offering continues to be a favorite and gives children an opportunity to participate in worship in a meaningful way. We raise anywhere between \$4,000 and \$7,000 for an organization dear to our hearts.

We cannot meet the goals of the Sunday Spirit program without the support of volunteers. The congregation's education program functions as a cooperative. Families who have children in the program are expected to assist in some way, and everyone is encouraged to play a part in the education of our children.

#### Third Grade Introduction to the Bible

For some 50 years, 3<sup>rd</sup> graders have met on Sunday mornings to learn about the Bible. We utilize multi-media teaching tools to engage the children, and the class is tailored to about 8 sessions. This class culminates every May when the children receive their own Bibles. # Middle School / High School Youth Groups

#### **Middle School Youth Group**

Middle School Youth Group continues to be strong! Kids look forward to our gatherings every other Friday. This excitement and energy have spread into the Bedford Community by word of mouth. On any given Friday we can have anywhere between 20 and 30 kids. Middle school youth group is an opportunity for our 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders to gather together on a regular basis to socialize, learn, serve others, and learn what it means to live as people of faith. We consistently meet every other Friday evening from 6:30 to 8:30 pm. One gathering a month is more service focused. Middle School Youth Group is an inclusive group – kids from all faith and non-faith backgrounds are welcome to participate. Words that embody what youth group is - Service, Inclusion, Friendship, Respect, Fun and Safe. Elyssa Michaels leads each youth group event. Laurie Fancher supports our youth groups and is on hand to fill in when needed.

#### **Program Highlights**

In terms of programming, middle school youth gravitate towards service-related programs and programs which are social in nature. We begin the Program Year in late September with group building games, free time and cooking. Other gatherings include group building nights, assembling breakfast bags for the Emergency Shelter Partnership, a kindness night, pizza party, Halloween fun, shopping for the Bedford Hills Correctional Facility Children's Center and projects with the organization Friends of Karen.

#### **High School Youth: Be the change**

In the winter of 2015 we began a High School Youth Group. Feedback has been positive. We now have 20-30 high school students participating in our youth group on a regular basis. HSYG continues to remain strong. The goal is to keep these teens engaged and participating throughout their high school career. The high school group meets twice a month on Sunday evenings from 5 to 7 pm. Gatherings include group building nights, fun and games, discussions, a haunted house, annual Holiday Party at Neighbors Link, shopping for the Bedford Hills Correctional Facility Children's Center, preparing and serving dinner for ESP and participating in a Midnight Run.

#### **Program Highlights**

Every year one of our most successful programs is the church-wide fundraiser Mistletoe Mart. Mistletoe Mart brings together people from all generations. The teens sell and serve chili to help with the cost of our annual work trips. Our Confirmation Mentorship Program usually begins in February with members of our congregation serving as Mentors for the members of our confirmation class. Speakers from a variety of faith traditions are usually invited to come and talk with our Confirmation students in March and Confirmation Sunday is in early May. In February each year we participate in a work trip with Bridges to Community where we usually have some 25 students and adults participating from Bedford Presbyterian and a similar number from Temple Shaaray Tefila. In June we hold an annual car wash to raise funds for our June work trip to West Virginia, and there is a service in recognition of our graduating high school seniors. Elyssa Michaels is our Youth Group leader. With the help of volunteers, Elyssa brings energy, fun and new ideas to the programs.

# **Work/Service Learning Trips**

Bedford Presbyterian Church sponsors two mission/service learning work trips for high school students and adults each year. These trips provide an opportunity to help and serve others, but also for participants to reflect about life, faith, values and the world in which we live. We have been taking work trips to Appalachia since

1990. In 2016 we began traveling to Colcord West Virginia for our summer work trip and plan to continue traveling there. We have also been taking work trips to Nicaragua since 1996 through the not-for-profit organization, Bridges to Community. We have recently begun traveling with them to the Dominican Republic. A grant from our local Mission Fund as well as contributions from the Women's Association help support both of these trips. Our staff liaisons are Patrick Vaughn and Kathy DiBiasi. Here is one comment from a young man who is an alumnus of the trips about his experiences here at Bedford Presbyterian (BPC) when he was in high school: "Without BPC, I would have missed out on a number of incredibly rewarding, instructive, and valuable experiences. I still believe that my trips to Nicaragua have shaped me more than any other event in my life. I came back a changed person. Saturdays doing Habitat were so enjoyable as well, and I have continued to do Habitat builds at Middlebury College. Midnight runs taught me so much about other people, such as not to judge others who may seem different, and to love my neighbors."

**Dominican Republic Trips – during school winter breaks in late February each year.** Adults and High School Teens. In a week's time we help build homes for four families in two communities. But more than that we will learn more about the world we live in and how we can continue to make a difference.

**Colcord, West Virginia Trips – usually during the last week of June each year.** Adults and High School Teens. We repair and rebuild homes in partnership with a local not-for-profit organization. We have repaired floors, replaced roofs, built porches and made countless homes more livable for families. Parents are encouraged to participate on both trips.

### **Bridges to Community**

The cycle of extreme poverty is not inescapable, but those in its clutches need our help to overcome their insufferable circumstances. Since 1992, Bridges to Community has succeeded in helping families and communities in impoverished areas of the Dominican Republic (DR) and Nicaragua build a better life for themselves and a brighter future for their children.

In partnership with residents and local leaders, we develop a comprehensive fiveyear plan in each community, focusing on housing, health, education and overall economic development. More than 700 volunteers travel with us each year, and programming is managed by in-country professional local staff. Learn more about each of our program areas below.

Bridges to Community engages in sustainable community development that has lasting impact for some of the most impoverished people in the Western Hemisphere. They accomplish this by forming long-term relationships with communities and bringing volunteers to help work on meaningful projects in housing, health, education and economic development alongside community members.

Bridges to Community is committed to providing a meaningful cross-cultural service learning experience for our volunteers, and at the same time engaging in sustainable

long-term community development projects that have lasting impact for some of the most impoverished people in Nicaragua and the Dominican Republic. In addition to organizing service learning trips through Bridges to Community in the Dominican Republic, our church has been supporting this organization through the special children's offering and other financial gifts from our mission budget for over 20 years.

#### **Westchester Youth Alliance**

In his essay We Are Each Other's Business, Eboo Patel, a Muslim, and founder and President of the Interfaith Youth Core, writes: "We live in a world where the forces that seek to divide us are strong. To overcome them, we must do more than simply stand next to one another in silence."

The Westchester Youth Alliance grew out of a dream of our church that our communities would be stronger and our world safer if we broke that silence and worked to build a better understanding between people of different faith traditions. And that the place to start was with our youth. We believed that if we could pull together a group of high school students from different faith traditions and give them an opportunity to learn with and from each other and to work side by side on community service projects we could model an understanding of community that would act as a counter balance to the fear and ignorance and misinformation which often divide us from each other. After more than a year of dreaming and planning and with funding we received from a grant, the Westchester Youth Alliance was launched in September 2012.

Our Mission is to build a bridge between our faith communities that will foster deep and lasting relationships among our high school students. Our interfaith youth program provides a vehicle for teens to engage in dialogue and action based on common values. Our activities include service projects and regular gatherings to connect, reflect and plan. #### **CROP Walk**

The CROP walk is a national fundraising event for Church World Service, an organization whose primary mission is to fight hunger and provide emergency relief both on a local and global scale. In 2019 the walk celebrates its 50th anniversary! Funds raised by our local CROP walk contribute to global hunger relief with 25% contributed to the Mount Kisco Interfaith Food Pantry and the food pantry run out of the Community Center of Northern Westchester in Katonah. The Northern Westchester walk started in 1994 and has raised as much as \$43,000 in one year and almost half a million dollars since its inception. It has traditionally been held in the Ward Pound Ridge Reservation but this year it will be moved closer to the communities served by bringing it into Katonah. If this is a well-received change, it may alternate with Mount Kisco in the future.

There is a lot of opportunity to get involved in helping to organize and run the walk, with a relatively small time commitment. Any help is welcome including: driving envelopes to participating congregations, stuffing envelopes, making signs, and helping with event planning and fundraising. On the walk day (usually the Sunday after Columbus Day) help will be needed running the walk. This is a great family opportunity. # **Holmes Presbyterian Camp and Conference Center**

HOLMES Presbyterian Camp and Conference Center is the outdoor Christian education and retreat facility of the Presbyteries of Hudson River, Long Island and New York City. Bedford Presbyterian Church along with the other 255 congregations in the New York metropolitan area own Holmes. The property is located less than 30 minutes from Bedford off of I-84 and consists of two year-round conference centers, three year-round retreat cabins, two seasonal youth facilities, a rustic camping program, several tent/trailer and day group areas, and an environmental science and arts program. The Center's three lakes and 550

wooded acres provide for swimming and boating, as well as fishing and ice-skating. Holmes provides programmed events, as well as rental facilities for conferences and retreats.

### **Woman to Woman Prison Ministry**

In the Fall of 2013, Bedford Presbyterian Church officially launched Woman 2 Woman, a prison ministry program which connects women in our congregation and community with women incarcerated at Bedford Hills Correctional Facility (BHCF), the only maximum-security women's prison in New York State. We have since expanded our work to Taconic Correctional Facility, a medium-security women's prison directly across the street from BHCF, as well.

Woman 2 Woman is designed to provide inmates, who often have little to no contact with the outside world, with much-needed emotional support, encouragement and friendship. Our goal is to also stretch our own capacity for empathy and understanding by developing a relationship of mutual respect and caring with someone whose history and circumstances are typically very different from our own. Nancy Gernert, Woman 2 Woman's first visitor, coordinates the program, in which more than 60 visitors are now enrolled. Each is assigned an inmate whom she

### **Laundry Love**

Laundry Love lends a neighborly hand to those who could use a little help meeting the cost of clean laundry once per month. We meet in the rear room of Manara Laundromat in Mount Kisco from 5-8pm on the middle Wednesday of each month. Between 50 - 100 people arrive to a friendly greeting, then clothing loads are weighed (limit 60 pounds per family; 25 pounds per individual), detergent offered, and pay cards swiped through to run the washers and dryers free of charge. Pizza and water are provided, along with coloring books and crayons for the children, and lollipops for the "kid" in everyone. The Laundry Love idea originated in California 16 years ago, when volunteers working with homeless people asked a man what would be of greatest help to him. He replied, "If I had clean clothes, people would treat me like a human being." From that simple conversation sprang the simple idea of literally "lightening the load" of those in need by helping them get their laundry done. It is an idea that has grown into more than 700 laundromats participating nationwide, each organized by local community members. Some Christian leaders regard this practice as "the new footwashing," and hail the "laundry as liturgy" approach. Congregations of all faiths are on board to lend their support, however, and this is not strictly a religious outreach. Local businesses donate food for the monthly events (Basilico pizzeria), community service organizations help get the word out (Neighbors Link, Mount Kisco Interfaith Food Pantry, Emergency Shelter Partnership), and social media posts have drawn in participants from every walk of life.
